Standardised Attainment Tests

"The statutory tests at the end of Key Stage 2 are designed to test pupils' knowledge and understanding of the KS2 Programmes of Study. They provide a snapshot of pupils' attainment at the end of the key stage."

Reading

- 60 minute reading paper
 - 3 texts of increasing challenge
 - Written questions requiring skills of:
 - Ranking/ordering, e.g. 'Number the events below to show the order in which they happen in the story'
 - Labelling, e.g. 'Label the text to show the title of the story'
 - **Find and copy**, e.g. 'Find and copy one word that suggests what the weather is like in the story'
 - Short constructed response, e.g. 'What does the bear eat?'
 - **Open-ended response**, e.g. 'Look at the sentence that begins *Once upon a time*. How does the writer increase the tension throughout this paragraph? Explain fully, referring to the text in your answer.


How to help your child at home...


Encourage them to read often, from a wide variety of texts, fiction and non-fiction.

- Ask questions about their reading
- Make sure they understand vocabulary
- Some ideas for questions can be found <u>here</u>

- 45 minute short answer paper on
 - Selected response, e.g. 'Identify the adjectives in the sentence below'
 - Constructed response, e.g. 'Correct/complete/rewrite the sentence below,' or, 'The sentence below has an apostrophe missing. Explain why it needs an apostrophe.'

- Spelling Test
 - 20 spellings in context. These will be challenging! They test the spelling rules taught in Yrs 3 to 6 and the Year 3/4 and 5/6 statutory words.


Help your child learn the common exception words from Yrs 3/4 and 5/6. These can be downloaded here (this document also includes the spelling rules they are expected to master).


[These have been included in spelling sessions in school for the past few years so the children should already have learnt most of them at some point!]


Use <u>spellingframe</u> to practice spelling rules.


- 30 minute Arithmetic Paper written calculations fixed response questions.
 - o For some of these will need to show working in a given method

- 2 x 40 minute Reasoning Papers
 - Multiple choice
 - o True or false
 - Constrained questions, e.g. giving the answer to a calculation, drawing a shape or completing a table or chart
 - Less constrained questions, where children will have to explain their approach for solving a problem.


Large pizzas cost £8.50 each.

Five children together buy one large pizza and three small pizzas.



Ensure rapid recall of times tables and related facts (e.g. division facts, factors and multiples, prime numbers to 50 etc; some children can practice their speed at recalling times tables facts by using Times Tables Rock Stars.


Ask your child which areas they find tricky. There will be lessons on mymaths which they can use to revise and practise these areas.

Writing

Not tested during SATS. Teacher Assessed

Working at the expected standard -

The pupil can write for a range of purposes and audiences (including writing a short story):

- creating atmosphere, and integrating dialogue to convey character and advance the action
- selecting vocabulary and grammatical structures that reflect the level of formality required mostly correctly
- using a range of cohesive devices*, including adverbials, within and across sentences and paragraphs
- using passive and modal verbs mostly appropriately
- using a wide range of clause structures, sometimes varying their position within the sentence
- using adverbs, preposition phrases and expanded noun phrases effectively to add detail, qualification and precision
- using inverted commas, commas for clarity, and punctuation for parenthesis mostly
- correctly, and making some correct use of semi-colons, dashes, colons and hyphens
- spelling most words correctly, including common exception words* (years 5 and 6)

Marking and Reporting

Tests are externally marked.

Results will be sent to schools early July

These will be communicated to parents.

These will include a raw score and a scaled score (80-120; 100 is the expected standard)
