We hope you all enjoyed your three day weekend. A short school week this week but no less busy. All of our living eggs have now hatched and the Year 3 classes have been enjoying the company of 10 fluffy (and noisy!) chicks. Thank you to Mrs Poole who organises the Living Eggs each year and ensures the chicks get the best start in life.

Sports clubs have started up this week and we have had record numbers attend our summer offerings. It is lovely to see so many children giving a sport a go. Thank you to the staff who give up their lunchtimes to provide the opportunities for the children.

What an exciting week it has been in **Year 3!** We were absolutely thrilled to see our Living Eggs all hatch, and they visited each of the Year 3 classrooms for a day. The delight on the children's faces as they interacted with our new feathered friends was priceless. We finished off our butterfly life cycle explanation texts in Literacy this week and the children have worked hard to use conjunctions and fronted adverbials to extend their sentences. In Maths, we have dived into our geometry unit, exploring turns, lines, and angles. The children are really enjoying discovering how these concepts shape the world around them. Our topic work continues with a fascinating exploration of where rainforests are located and an investigation into the world's climates and biomes. In Art, we're further developing our self-portrait skills, focusing on the size and proportion of facial features. The results are coming along beautifully! In RE, we are looking at how different religions express faith through art. This week, we've focused on Islamic art, with the children designing their very own prayer mats. In PSHE we have been discussing our emotions and it has been wonderful to see the children talking openly about good and bad feelings. We have looked at different ways we can increase our good feelings and what to do when we find ourselves in the bad 'feels'. Finally, we have to mention 3A's assembly on George and the Dragon which was amazing! The children showcased their talents brilliantly, and it was a joy to see the hard work they put into their performances. Well done, 3A!

After a fantastic few days away at Hooke Court, **Year 4** have returned full of stories and are back into the swing of learning with great enthusiasm! In Literacy, the children have continued exploring riddles and kennings poetry, writing their own imaginative and creative pieces. In Maths, they've started an exciting new unit focusing on time - learning how to read an analogue clock and understanding different units of measure. During PAG, the children revisited how to correctly punctuate direct speech, while in Spellings, they explored the /k/ sound spelt with <ch>. In Whole Class Reading, the children continued their journey through the gripping novel *Kensuke's Kingdom*. In Science, they explored how animals can be grouped as vertebrates and invertebrates, making thoughtful observations and comparisons. In Computing, the children began learning about the importance of coding and started developing their own coding skills using Scratch. In History, they've been continuing with the topic of Invaders and Settlers, exploring the fascinating legacy left behind by the Romans. In Art, some children put the finishing touches on their abstract architecture pieces, while others began a brand-new unit exploring the techniques of wonderful weaving. In RE, they've been reflecting on the story of the Last Supper and its significance. In PSHE, the children have been discussing the importance of physical and mental wellbeing, thinking about how to take care of themselves and support others. In PE, they've continued to enjoy Gymnastics, learning to travel and move confidently across equipment such as the vault and beam. During Games lessons, the focus has been on Athletics and Cricket, with children practising their running and throwing skills with great enthusiasm. It's been a fun and fulfilling week of learning, and we look forward to what next week brings!

Year 5 have had another short but busy week and have thoroughly enjoyed all of our learning! We have come to the end of our decimals unit in Maths and consolidated all our learning around this. In Geography, we have looked in more detail at how mountains are formed. We have also continued our Science unit, carrying out some practical investigations into gears, levers and pulleys. In DT, we have started to experiment with different bridge designs, ready to build the complete bridge in a couple of weeks' time. We're all looking forward to

the residential and activity week next week! Our **Year 6** pupils have been working incredibly hard as we continue our SATs preparation – we're very proud of the effort and determination they're showing each day. A big thank you to everyone who auditioned for the upcoming Year 6 performance – the talent and enthusiasm on display will make it a tough job for our casting team! Best of luck to those who are training and trying out for the District Sports – we're already cheering you on. Meanwhile, we're still enjoying diving deeper into our fascinating WWII topic, uncovering stories and experiences from the past. After such a busy and productive week, we hope everyone enjoys a well-deserved and restful weekend.
