## Phones On Site

From Monday 13th October, we are asking all parents, carers and visitors not to use mobile phones on the school site. This includes the playground, school entrance areas, corridors and all other parts of the school site during drop off, pick up and when visiting the school for any reason.

#### Why are we making this decision?

We aim to keep our children safe by creating a safer environment where children cannot be inadvertently captured in photos or videos. It ensures our safeguarding procedures are robust and consistently applied.

It is important to model good phone behaviour to children and demonstrate that we value real conversation and connection. It reinforces the same expectations we have of pupils and shows our children that they deserve our full attention.

We want to strengthen communication and community by building valuable opportunities for parents, carers, children and staff to engage in brief but important conversations about the school day.

#### What this means in practice

#### We are asking you to:

- Keep your mobile phone in your pocket or bag when on the school site
- Not make or receive calls whilst on school premises
- Not take photographs or videos (except at designated school events where this is explicitly permitted)

Request for Contributions

Year 3 had the opportunity to demonstrate their teamwork skills in our Outdoor Learning sessions this week. As we explored our beautiful school grounds, children worked in groups to write poetry and create natural art using the resources they could find in the environment. We finished by using crayons to make some wonderful tree rubbings. In Literacy, we have started to look at the wonderful story of Fantastic Mr Fox, and explore the characters created by Roald Dahl. We put our drama skills to the test and 'hot-seated' different characters to find out more about them, we then applied our descriptive writing skills to describe the interesting farmers. In Maths, we have been adding and subtracting crossing the tens boundary. Place value grids, base ten equipment and number lines have really helped us to develop our understanding. On Thursday we enjoyed an assembly led by our school Eco-Council to let us know about how we can help our school and local community to be more environmentally friendly. We have lots planned to ensure we continue to be as 'green' as possible across the year!

It's been another busy and exciting week in Year 4. In Literacy, we've reached the planning stage of our warning stories, focusing on the build-up, problem, and resolution. The children have come up with some wonderfully creative ideas! In Maths, we've been exploring addition both with and without exchanging and have been applying our understanding to tackle some tricky reasoning and problem-solving questions. In Science, we evaluated our findings from last week's evaporation investigation. The children concluded that heat and spreading out the water help it evaporate more quickly! In Geography, we've been learning about the different types of flooding, how floods occur and their environmental impact. Over in Art, the children have begun printing their own interpretations of Claude Monet's Water Lilies onto fabric, ready for our exciting DT unit next half term. In PSHE, we continued our learning on relationships, discussing how to manage social pressures within friendships. It's been a fabulous week, with the children working super hard across all subjects. They've definitely earned a big rest over the weekend!

We must start the Newsletter by mentioning the wonderful experience our students had during the STEAM trip to Thorpe Park. The day was filled with excitement and learning, as the children engaged with both the numerous and varied stalls on offer and the rides of course! Children have continued with their addition and subtraction unit this week and have tried multistep problems as well as missing numbers. We looked at inverse operations and how and when we use them. In Science, we completed part 2 of our exploration of the properties of materials, focusing on thermal conductivity. The children engaged in their second investigation, which they thoroughly enjoyed. In Computing, we focused on honing our research skills, with an emphasis on understanding Google searches. This week, we completed our Family and Friendships unit in PSHE. Our final focus was "When Friendships Change". It's an important aspect of the children's social development and it offered a safe space for pupils to discuss their feelings and experiences. Finally, basketball continued in PE and we are building a range of skills on court, including jump stops with a bounce pass. Another busy week but one which we won't forget! Thanks to all the parents who supported our trip this week.

It's been another busy week in Year 6! The children have continued to impress us with their curiosity, effort, and enthusiasm across all subjects. In History, we've been learning about some remarkable figures from the Victorian era, including Charles Dickens, Charles Darwin, Florence Nightingale, Lord Shaftesbury, and Emmeline Pankhurst. The children have shown great interest in discovering how these individuals helped shape the world we live in today. In Literacy, pupils have produced some outstanding work through our Pickpockets News Reports project. They've demonstrated a strong grasp of switching between formal and informal language and using both past and present tense effectively — very impressive skills for young writers! In Mathematics, our focus has remained on multiplication and division. This week, we've been developing written methods and applying them to reasoning and problem-solving challenges. In Science, the children have continued exploring the fascinating topic of classification, creating their own dichotomous branching keys to organise and identify living things.

Looking ahead, our Victorian immersion days will continue next Wednesday for classes 6B, 6S, and 6T, while 6P, 6F, and 6PD will enjoy their outdoor learning day. We're looking forward to seeing everyone get involved and learning in new, creative ways.

# Important Safeguarding Notice: Children's "Spy" Books

We want to make you aware of a recent issue affecting some popular children's books by Andrew Cope, including the *Spy Dogs*, *Spy Cats*, and *Spy Pups* series. Some editions of these books include a printed web address at the back. This link used to go to the author's website, but the domain is no longer under his control. It has since been taken over by another party and now leads to inappropriate adult content.

The publisher, Puffin, has paused sales and distribution of the books and is working with schools, libraries, and retailers to remove copies from circulation. They have stressed that the website has no connection to the author or publisher. We have removed these books from our libraries and classes.

- If your child has any Spy Dog, Spy Cat or Spy Pups books at home, please check the back for website links and make sure they do not try to visit the site.
- It is safe for children to continue reading the stories themselves — the concern is only with the outdated link.
- We recommend talking with your child about the importance of not following web addresses in books without checking with an adult first.

## Can you Pack a Plastic Free Lunch & Save the Marine Life?

Choosing plastic-free options for lunches directly helps marine life by reducing the amount of single-use plastic waste that enters the ocean. Since a significant portion of ocean pollution comes from land-based sources like food and drink packaging, preparing your lunch without plastic prevents these items from harming marine ecosystems and the animals within them.

To pack a plastic-free lunch, replace single-use plastics with reusable alternatives like stainless steel containers, beeswax wraps and silicone bags, along with a reusable water bottle. You can also buy foods in bulk instead of small, individually packaged items, and use leftovers from dinner to save money and reduce waste.

### Absence Penalties

Just to remind parents/carers that if they take their children out of school without authority for 5 or more days (which do not have to be consecutive), then the following will apply:

- If you have not incurred a penalty notice relating to this child/children in a rolling 3 year period since 19 August 2024, then the penalty notice will be charged at the rate of £160.00, per parent/carer per child, if paid within 28 days. This will be reduced to £80.00 if paid within 21 days of receipt of the notice. Failure to pay the Penalty Notice will result in Surrey County Council considering legal proceedings against you in the Magistrates Court.
- If you have incurred a penalty notice relating to this child/children since 19 August 2024, the rolling 3 year period will be activated from the date of the first penalty notice and the second penalty notice will be charged at the flat rate of £160.00, per parent/carer per child, if paid within 28 days. There will be no reduction for payment within 21 days. Failure to pay the Penalty Notice will result in Surrey County Council considering legal proceedings against you in the Magistrates Court.

## Absence Penalties (cont'd)

 If you have incurred 2 penalty notices relating to this child/children in the rolling 3 year period since the first penalty notice was issued, then you will NOT receive a third penalty notice – Surrey County Council will have no option but to consider a prosecution, per parent/carer per child, in the Magistrates Court under s 444 Education Act 1996.

Surrey County Council is not responsible for authorising pupil absence and therefore cannot withdraw any Penalty Notice requests without the written permission of the Headteacher.

### Leave of Absence

Please be aware that we have introduced a new system for the recording of absence using a newly created page on our school website. This will allow us to centralise the messages we receive and create a smoother process for our staff.

The <u>Absence Reporting Tab</u> allows you to record:

- 1. Sickness (on the day)
- 2. Requests for absence from school known in advance

Please note that the email address absence@cleves.co.uk is no longer in use. We kindly also ask that you do not email info@cleves.co.uk or office@cleves.co.uk with any absence information as these inboxes are not monitored consistently throughout the day. This will help ensure that your message is received promptly by our admin team.
