What a great start our new Year 3 pupils have made to life at Cleves! Children are settling well and we are very impressed with how they are quickly adapting to our classroom routines. Poetry has been high on the agenda in our Literacy lessons this week. Children have explored a range of acrostic poems and written their own all about themselves. Some pupils were even brave enough to perform to their class! Our Maths has begun by exploring place value using a range of different concrete resources. To start our 'United Kingdom' topic we have explored maps of our local area from different periods in history as well as a most recent version. We were shocked to see how much the area around Cleves has changed! We have practised logging on to the Cleves Hub using our new details, so are all ready to start our first homework!

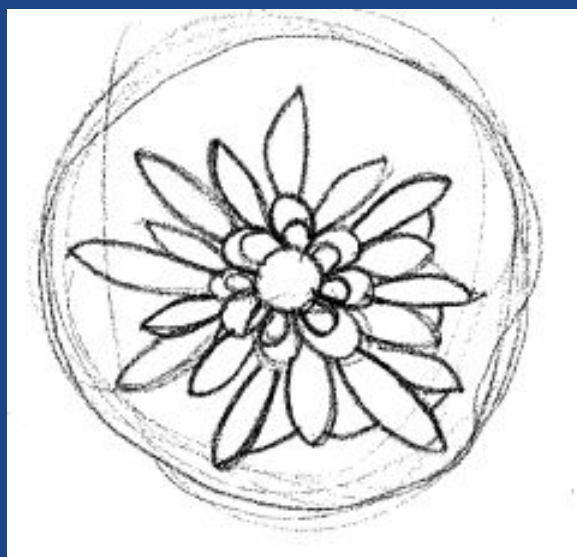
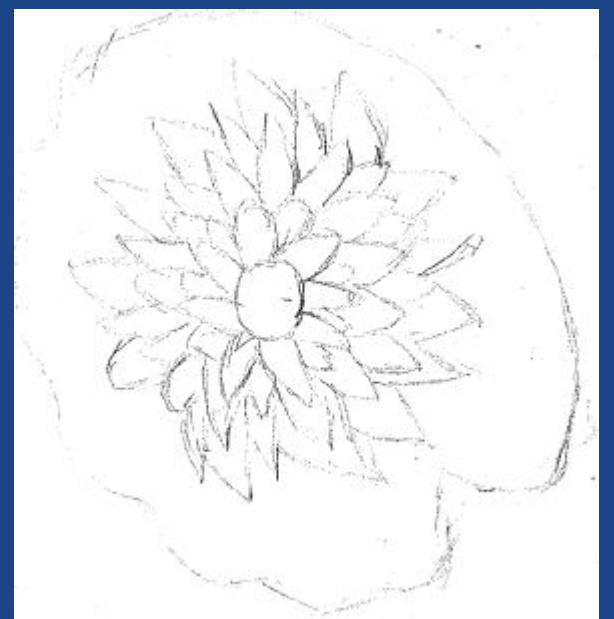
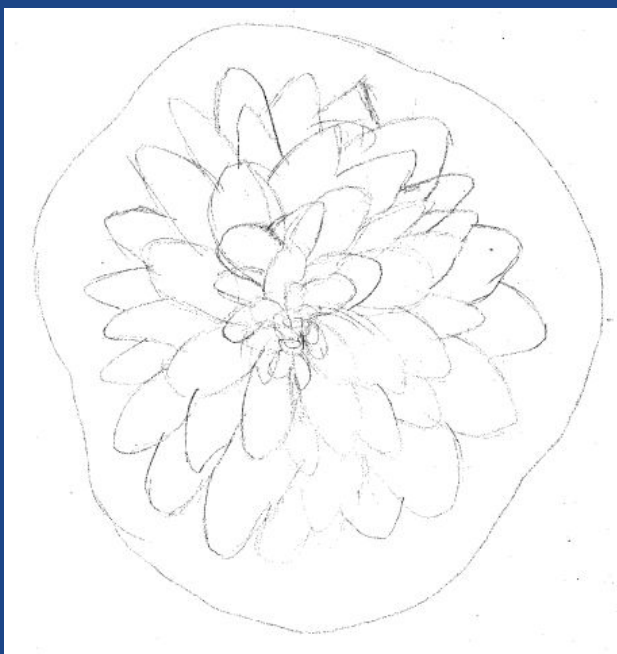


Year 4

Year 4 have had an incredible start to the academic year! We have been so impressed with their use of vocabulary in Literacy. The children have been describing a setting, getting creative with their use of expanded noun phrases. Year 4 also have shown fantastic focus whilst learning about number and Place Value in Maths. This week they have explored four digit numbers, exploring different ways of representing a number. The children have also got stuck into their Science lessons, enjoying a fizzy Science experiment! Ask your child for more information! Then, saving the best till last, they have all been creative sketching within Art. The children learnt the key features of expressionism and started exploring Claude Monet's work.

All the Year 4 teachers are buzzing about the year ahead!

Year 5

We hope you have had a fantastic summer and that this finds you well and excited for the new school year! Firstly, we would like to thank all the families who attended our Meet the Teacher event as well as your engagement during our Parent Information Evening. Your involvement is crucial to us and we appreciate your ongoing support.

We have all had a wonderful first full week back! Our curriculum work has begun and the children have been eager to get cracking on the new learning. This term's topic is The Tudors and this week we looked at the Monarchs from 1066 to 1399 as well as discussing the Magna Carta and its Legacy. We have also discussed Rights and Responsibilities of the child (as we do every year at this time) and created new Class Charters, which lays the foundation for our classroom environment. It emphasises respect, responsibility, and kindness. This week in Maths, pupils began revisiting place value concepts, enhancing and building on their knowledge from the lower school. The children started work on their first literacy unit which is a 3rd-person narrative set in Mega City. They have already impressed with their descriptive language of contrasting settings.

Year 5

Year 5 began their journey into Tudor portraiture, looking at various examples of art work from the time. The final outcome at the end of the unit is always a real favourite amongst the children and we look forward to sharing these with you!

In Science, our focus this half term is Properties of Materials. This week we started grouping and classifying materials, using key vocabulary to group materials based on their properties. We look forward to sharing more highlights next week.

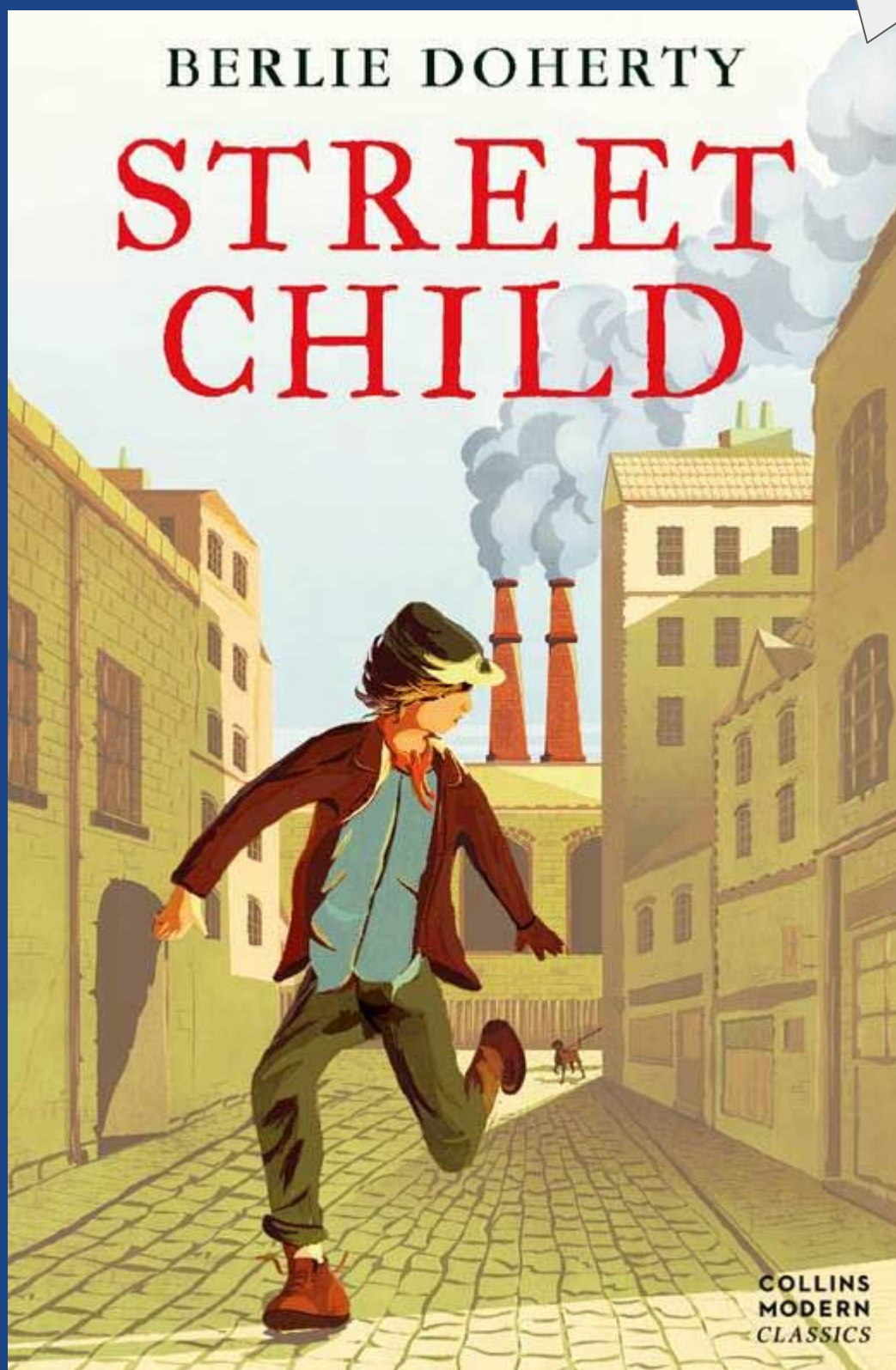
Year 6

What a fantastic first full week back we've had in Year 6! The children have thrown themselves straight into our brand-new topic on the Victorians with energy and curiosity. To kick things off, we explored a timeline of the Stuart and Hanover monarchs, which bridges our knowledge of the Tudors from Year 5 right through to the Victorian era. In addition, we've uncovered fascinating key events such as the Gunpowder Plot and the Great Fire of London. In Maths, we've been revisiting place value, working hard to strengthen our reasoning and problem-solving skills. In Literacy, our new unit is based on *Street Child* by Bertie Doherty, the moving story of a Victorian boy named Jim Jarvis. The children have impressed us with powerful vocabulary to describe the workhouse and used emotive language and "show, not tell" techniques to really step into the character's shoes. We can't wait to see these ideas come alive in their first hot task next week! Meanwhile, our "World Cup of Books" challenge is in full swing - each class is reading, reviewing, and voting for their favourites. We'll be revealing the winning book from each class very soon! In Science, we've launched into our *All Living Things* unit, beginning with how to classify animals, plants, and microorganisms.

Year 6

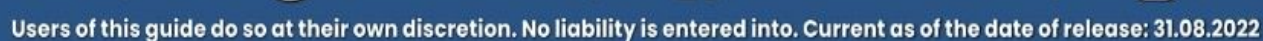

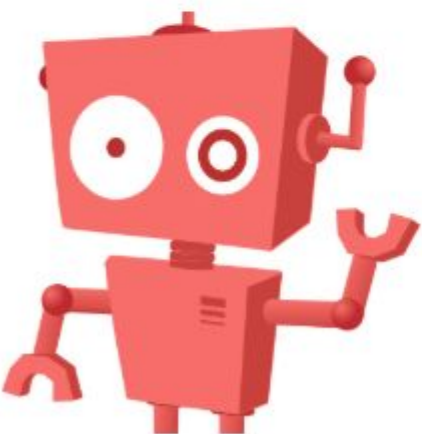

Absence Penalties

Just to remind parents/carers that if they take their children out of school without authority for 5 or more days (which do not have to be consecutive), then the following will apply:

- If you have not incurred a penalty notice relating to this child/children in a rolling 3 year period since 19 August 2024, then the penalty notice will be charged at the rate of £160.00, per parent/carer per child, if paid within 28 days. This will be reduced to £80.00 if paid within 21 days of receipt of the notice. Failure to pay the Penalty Notice will result in Surrey County Council considering legal proceedings against you in the Magistrates Court.
- If you have incurred a penalty notice relating to this child/children since 19 August 2024, the rolling 3 year period will be activated from the date of the first penalty notice and the second penalty notice will be charged at the flat rate of £160.00, per parent/carer per child, if paid within 28 days. There will be no reduction for payment within 21 days. Failure to pay the Penalty Notice will result in Surrey County Council considering legal proceedings against you in the Magistrates Court.

Absence Penalties (cont'd)

- If you have incurred 2 penalty notices relating to this child/children in the rolling 3 year period since the first penalty notice was issued, then you will NOT receive a third penalty notice – Surrey County Council will have no option but to consider a prosecution, per parent/carer per child, in the Magistrates Court under s 444 Education Act 1996.

Surrey County Council is not responsible for authorising pupil absence and therefore cannot withdraw any Penalty Notice requests without the written permission of the Headteacher.
