THIS WEEK

It's been a busy week at school with our year 6 pupils confidently navigating through their mock SATs. We also had our year 4 pupils enjoying their trip to Hooke Court and for those who remained at school - Walton Firs.

A big well done to those involved last weekend at the London Marathon - Mrs Harrison, Miss Childs and Mr Mulea! Also to the 50 Cleves children who took part in the mini marathon! What a great experience.

It's been a cracking week in **Year 3** and we have been very egg-cited by the arrival of some eggs. The eggs have now hatched and we have 9 beautiful chicks! The chicks are now in their brooder box and will be carefully looked after over the weekend. The children have been observing the eggs this week and the chicks will be visiting the classrooms next week, continuing with their science unit about All Living Things. We have also been learning about the life cycle of chicks as part of our literacy unit on explanation texts. In addition, all classes have some caterpillars that we are observing closely so children will have first-hand experience of witnessing the metamorphosis a caterpillar goes through in its life cycle. In maths, we are continuing our work on fractions and have been ordering unit and non-unit fractions as well as adding and subtracting fractions. In RE, we are continuing our work on Islam and learning about the Qur'an. In our topic lesson this week, we have been finding some key locations on a world map including the Equator, the Tropics of Cancer and Capricorn, the Northern and Southern Hemispheres and the Arctic and Antarctic Circles. We would like to say a BIG thank you to all of the parent helpers who accompanied 3H and 3D on their visit to the Natural History Museum yesterday as part of our science topic. We really appreciated your support! We know that the children had an amazing time and that the rest of the year group are looking forward to their trips over the course of the next few weeks. Pottery, shields, helmet making, cooking, climbing crates, achieving the nightline and rolling down the hill on a buggy (we made) is what the Year 4 children in school have completed this week. We have enjoyed every day and every day we have managed to learn a new skill, whether that be in the kitchen, hanging from a rope, making knots to secure our buggies and having the best time whilst doing so. For the other children who are away, we have had the most amazing week at Hooke Court! It has been such an incredible

experience and we cannot wait to tell you all about it. We started off building Viking ships and racing them in the lake - we even lit one on fire! We had a barn dance, went on a beautiful bluebell walk and a few of us got married at an Anglo-Saxon wedding around a campfire! We built shelters, played tribal games and spent the day living like the Anglo-Saxons and Norsemen; cooking, weaving, making jewellery and using a very interesting cement to build walls! Did you know we're not meant to say Viking because it's technically a doing word? We learnt all about rockets and watched them launch into the air! It was a truly wonderful week, where we showed kindness, inclusion and worked together as a team!

Year 5 has been very busy this week! Our new and exciting Literacy unit on Treasure Island has seen us create some of our own gruesome and menacing pirates that would intimidate even the strongest of characters - let alone poor Jim Hawkins! We have even started to create some dialogue for our characters and have looked at how they may interact in a tense confrontation. Within Maths, we have continued looking at decimals and have spent the final part of the week working on multiplying and dividing decimal numbers by 10, 100 and 1000. Our Athletics PE lessons have seen us work on jumping for distance and looking at the best technique for not only a large distance but also a safe and strong landing! The Topic lesson this week has been very interesting as we have looked at some of the most famous mountains and ranges in the world. We have spent some time studying the different features and terms associated with mountains, mountain ranges and how they are formed in different ways. Year 6 has had a very busy week! We have worked incredibly hard with our mock SATs and are very proud of ourselves. We all now know what to expect for the real thing and are feeling more prepared than ever! We have even managed to squeeze in some great lessons too! In Literacy, we started writing our first chapter of our evacuees narrative, looking at the different emotions children across the country were feeling. Then in Science we have continued exploring the circulatory system and how it works by setting up a racing track to help develop our understanding. We are learning about World War II in History so we started designing our creative timelines that we can refer back to throughout the topic. We ended our week having lots of fun on the field playing football, handball and netball. Well done Year 6 for all your hard work this week!
